Application for Works to Trees(s) subject to a Tree Preservation Order(TPO)

Development: Crown reduction to 1 No. English Oak (T1) to leave a Northerly spread of 8m and crown to be thinned by 10%. This tree is located in the Craigweil House, Aldwick Conservation Area.

Location: Stratton 9 Kingsway Aldwick PO21 4DQ

Thank you for your application which was received on 4th December 2025. I am writing to acknowledge that it was accepted as a valid application on 4th December 2025. On receipt of this letter, if you have any concerns about the way that the Council has described your application you should contact **Silvie Steiningerova**, the case officer who is dealing with your application.

The Council will publicise this application by means of a site notice on or near the application site and on our website. **The notice needs to be displayed until the date indicated on it for comments to be made by and for not less than 21 days.** After this period it can be removed. If there are any problems with regards to the site notice (e.g. vandalism), please contact the case officer.

Your application cannot be determined until the end of the statutory publicity and consultation periods which is 11th January 2026. You can follow how your application is progressing on the Council's website: <https://www.arun.gov.uk/planning-application-search>

The Council aims to make as many decisions as possible before the end of the statutory determination period, which in this case will be 29th January 2026. However, this is not always possible for a number of reasons, including on-going negotiations or the scheduling of Planning Committees.

If you have not received a decision by 29th January 2026 or agreed in writing to extend the time in which

the Council make a decision, you may appeal to the Secretary of State. Your appeal (under Regulation 19 of the Town & Country Planning (Tree Preservation) (England) Regulations 2012) would be that the Council has failed to make a decision and you would be asking a Government Planning Inspector to make the decision instead. You can do this on a form which you can get from the Planning Inspectorate, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol, BS1 6PN or from the Planning Inspectorate: <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/tree-preservation-order-appeal-form/>

If you allow the Council extra time to make a decision on your application, and you disagree with the decision, you will still be able to appeal within 28 days from the date the decision was issued.

Finally, can I remind you that it is a criminal offence to carry out, allow or authorise works to trees protected by a Tree Preservation Order without first having the Council's consent. Anyone found guilty of works that are likely to destroy a protected tree is liable, if convicted in the Magistrates' Court to a fine up to £20,000. In serious cases a person may be committed for trial in the Crown Court and if convicted, liable to an unlimited fine.
