Description of works: Outline planning application with all matters reserved (except access proposed along Ford Lane) for development of up to 400 No dwellings, a 8-10 form entry secondary school with associated sports pitches and facilities, a community hub building of up to 600 sqm, new pedestrian and cycle routes, Public Open Space, sustainable urban drainage system, landscaping and associated infrastructure. This application lies within the parish of Ford and Yapton, affects the setting of listed buildings, affects a Public Right of Way and is a Departure from the Development Plan. This is a CIL liable development.

Thank you for your internet representation made on 6th July 2025 which has been recorded as an objection with the comments as follows:

I wish to object to Outline Planning Application F/19/25/OUT, relating to proposed development on land south of Ford Lane, on the following grounds:

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**1. Harm to the Setting of Listed Buildings**

The development would cause significant harm to the setting of nearby listed buildings, contrary to Section 66(1) of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990. These heritage assets are currently experienced within a largely rural and undeveloped setting, which is integral to their historic and architectural significance. Introducing modern built form would erode this character, resulting in less than substantial harm that is not outweighed by any public benefit, in conflict with NPPF Paragraphs 199-202.

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## 2. Adverse Impact on Public Right of Way

A designated Public Right of Way (PROW) runs through or adjacent to the site and would be negatively affected by this development. The current experience of this PROW is defined by open countryside views and tranquillity, both of which would be significantly diminished. The proposed development would introduce noise, visual intrusion, and possible realignment or restriction of access, in conflict with NPPF Paragraph 100, which requires the protection and enhancement of public access routes.

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## 3. Departure from the Development Plan

This application represents a clear departure from the adopted Local Development Plan, as the site is located outside the defined settlement boundary and is not allocated for development. The proposal undermines the plan-led approach to sustainable growth and risks opening the door to speculative, unplanned expansion in the countryside. It directly conflicts with the local planning authority's spatial strategy and relevant policies governing rural protection, housing allocations, and settlement hierarchy.

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## 4. Increased Traffic and Highway Safety Concerns

Ford Lane is a narrow, rural road with limited capacity and no footpaths in sections. The proposed development would result in a significant increase in vehicle traffic, including construction traffic during the development phase and longer-term residential traffic thereafter. This raises serious concerns about road safety, particularly for pedestrians, cyclists, and existing residents. The increase in traffic is disproportionate to the road's infrastructure and would worsen congestion, increase risk of accidents, and degrade the rural character of the lane. No sufficient mitigation has been proposed to address these impacts.

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## 5. Irreversible Harm to Landscape Character

The site currently forms part of an open, rural landscape that contributes to the visual amenity of the area, including the setting of listed buildings and the enjoyment of the PROW. Development here would result in the permanent loss of this character, with no adequate justification or landscape mitigation. This is contrary to local policies seeking to preserve landscape sensitivity, rural identity, and green infrastructure.

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## Conclusion

Outline Planning Application F/19/25/OUT fails on multiple grounds: it is contrary to national heritage policy, harms a Public Right of Way, departs from the adopted Development Plan, would increase traffic on an unsuitable rural lane, and causes lasting damage to the local landscape. I therefore strongly urge the planning authority to refuse this application in the interest of preserving the character, safety, and planning integrity of the area.

Your views as made above will be considered before the application is determined.
